- Willem Goedhard (Netherlands) -- Extending the Working Life: challenges and perspectives;

AGING RESEARCH AT THE HCII 2005 CONFERENCE

From July 22 -27, the 11th International Conference on Human-Computer Interaction was held in Las Vegas. It was a joint conference with nine main thrusts, including: Augmented Cognition, Universal Access, Human-Computer Interfaces, Usability & Internationalization, Human Interfaces (Japan), Virtual Reality, Online Communities & Social Computing, Ergonomics & Health Aspects of Work, and Engineering Psychology & Cognitive Ergonomics.

There were four sessions devoted entirely to aging research: Facilitating Web Access for Older Adults, Visual Information Acquisition and Cognition of Older Users, Older Adults, Speech Based Information Systems and Driving Safety, and Accessibility for Users with Special Needs - Enhancing Lifestyles for the Elderly. In addition, there were at least six posters and 15 other papers related to aging issues interspersed throughout the conference in other sessions, mainly within the Universal Access thrust. As might be expected, the main topics related to using the web, ATM machines, and cell phones, older drivers, and designing aids for the older population. The proceedings for the conference have been published via CD-ROM by Lawrence Erlbaum Associates, Inc (LEA).
